

Performance comparison of four Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors

Executive summary

Intel Corporation (Intel) commissioned Principled Technologies (PT) to run a set of performance tests on the following Dell XPS 700 desktop systems:

- Dell XPS 700 with an Intel Pentium D processor 940
- Dell XPS 700 with an Intel Pentium D processor 960
- Dell XPS 700 with an Intel Core 2 Duo processor E6700
- Dell XPS 700 with an Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800

The goal of the testing was to gauge the performance that buyers would experience when performing common tasks. Dell and Intel provided the test systems. PT identified the tests, test procedures, and test settings. PT also set up the systems and executed all tests.

We used the following industry-standard benchmark to gauge performance on common office applications:

 Office productivity, which runs typical office applications using BAPCo SYSmark 2004 SE


We created custom tests to measure the performance of the following common tasks:

THE BOTTOM LINE

- The Dell systems with Intel Core 2 Duo processors delivered a noticeably better computing experience than the Intel Pentium D processor-based Dell systems on all tests.
- The Dell system with the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 outperformed the Dell system with the Intel Pentium D processor 940 by as much as 80 percent on a set of single-task application scenarios.
- The Dell system with the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 maintained a 40 to over 80 percent performance edge over the Intel Pentium D processor 940-based Dell system on tasks with or without a background virus scan running.
- The Dell system with the Intel Core 2 Duo processor E6700 outperformed the Dell system with the Intel Pentium D processor 960 by 30 to over 50 percent on a set of single-task application scenarios.
- **Photo editing**, which opens and edits a group of 30 digital photos using Adobe Photoshop Elements 4.0 and then prepares a slideshow with background music for burning onto a DVD using Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0
- **Photo editing while scanning for viruses**, which performs the same photo editing tasks while a virus scan runs using Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006
- Gaming, which plays a built-in game demo on Sierra Entertainment F.E.A.R. (with Patch 1.06)
- Gaming while scanning for viruses, which performs the same gaming tasks while a virus scan runs using Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006
- Music encoding, which uses Apple iTunes 6.0.4 to create mp3 files from wav files
- **Music encoding while scanning for viruses**, which performs the same music encoding tasks while a virus scan runs using Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006
- Video encoding, which converts an .avi file into a streaming video using Windows Media Encoder 9.0
- Video encoding while scanning for viruses, which performs the same video encoding tasks while a virus scan runs using Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006

Figure 1 summarizes the test results for each custom test running on its own. Each of these results is a relative rating of the median of three test results on each system. We calculate this relative comparison by dividing each test system's score by the Pentium D processor 940-based system's score (the slowest test system in this group) for tests in which a higher score is better, and by dividing the Pentium D processor 940-based system's score by the other test system's score for tests in which a lower score is better. Consequently, comparative results above

1.00 indicate tests on which each system outperformed the Pentium D processor 940-based system, and those below 1.0 indicate tests the Pentium D processor 940-based system won.




As Figure 1 shows, the Dell XPS systems with Intel Core 2 processors significantly out-performed those with Intel Pentium D processors. The difference was great enough to represent a tangible, real-life improvement in computing experience for the consumer.

Figure 1: Relative single-task results for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the customized tests.


How our multitasking tests work

Modern PC users typically perform many tasks at the same time. For example, a virus scan may need to run at the same time you need to do some work. Our multitasking tests assess the effect of a secondary, or background, task on the task that you're actively performing (the foreground task). Our multitasking scenarios make this assessment by running a virus scan in the background and then at the same time running one of the other tests. Each multitasking test follows this basic pattern: Scott wants to play F.E.A.R., but his scheduled virus scan is running. He's in a quandary. Does he wait for the virus scan to complete? Does he stop the scan in the interest of continuing his game? Does his system slow because it has to handle the load of running both the game and a virus scan? Or, does he fail to even notice the scan is running because the processor handles both tasks with little to no degradation in performance?

Figure 2 presents the relative multitasking results for our four test tasks while running a virus scan in the background. The Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 outperforms the Intel Pentium D processor 940 by amounts ranging from over 50 to over 90 percent while a Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006 scan runs in the background. Figure 3 shows the results for the background antivirus scan running at the same time as each of these tests.

Figures 2 and 3 both include the BAPCo SYSmark 2004 SE – Office Productivity test results because this test incorporates both foreground and background tasks. The results are identical in both figures.

The Test results section provides detailed results of these tests. The Test methodology section explains how we ran each of these tests. Appendix A provides the details of the system configurations.

Test results

Table 1 presents the medians of all test scores for all four systems. (We ran each test three times on each system.) In most cases, lower scores are better, because each score is the time the system required to complete each workload. A lower time indicates that the system completed the work faster. The two exceptions are in the office productivity test (SYSmark 2004 SE – Office Productivity), where a higher score indicates better system performance, and in the gaming test (F.E.A.R.), where the higher the frames per second (fps) result indicates better gaming graphics performance.

Office productivity test (BAPCo SYSmark 2004 SE – Office Productivity)




Figure 4: Relative performance for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the office productivity test.

Figure 4 presents the relative test results for the office productivity test. The system with the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 outperformed the Intel Pentium D processor 940-based system by over 50 percent. It also beat the Core 2 Duo processor E6700-based system, by about 6 percent. This time difference translates into a tangible improvement in a consumer's ability to perform such important tasks as working on letters and other documents, developing budgets and other spreadsheets, and surfing the Web with a browser.

Photo editing test (Adobe Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0)




Figure 5: Relative performance for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the photo editing test.

Figure 5 presents the relative performance differences in our photo editing test. The Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800-based system outperforms the system with the Intel Pentium D processor 940 by over 50 percent running this test, saving the user 20 seconds on the process of creating these slides. Adding the antivirus scan in the background has minimal impact on the performance of the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800-based system, which still outperforms the system with the Intel Pentium D processor 940 by over 50 percent in this multitasking scenario.

Gaming test (Sierra Entertainment F.E.A.R. + Patch 1.06)




Figure 6: Relative performance for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the gaming test.

Figure 6 presents the relative results for the gaming test using F.E.A.R. on our four test systems. The trend shows an increase in performance from the Intel Pentium D processor 940-based system up to the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800-based system. The system with the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 experienced an increase in gaming performance with the addition of a virus scan in the background.

Music encoding performance test (Apple iTunes 6.0.4)




Figure 7: Relative performance for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the music encoding test.

Figure 7 presents the relative results for the music encoding performance test using Apple iTunes 6.0.4. Again we see the performance increasing with faster processors. The system with the Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800 outperformed the Intel Pentium D processor 940-based system by over 80 percent when we ran this test alone and by almost that amount when we ran the test with an antivirus scan in the background. This translates into almost a minute of time the user will save on the process of creating this file.

Video encoding performance test (Microsoft Windows Media Encoder 9.0 with Advanced Profiling)




Figure 8: Relative performance for Dell XPS 700 systems with various Intel processors on the video encoding test.

Figure 8 presents the relative performance results for the video encoding test using Microsoft Windows Media Encoder 9.0. The Intel Core 2 Extreme processor X6800-based system outperformed the Intel Pentium D processor 940-based system by 70 percent, a savings of over 30 seconds. In the multitasking scenario, the performance did not noticeably decrease despite the additional virus scan task occurring in the background.

Test methodology

Intel and Dell configured and provided all four PCs. This section details the methodologies we followed in testing the systems.

Initial setup

When the systems arrived, we unpacked and set up each one. We used identical Dell keyboards and mice on the systems. We also used identical ViewSonic Optiquest Q7 monitors from our test stock. We went through the following process with each PC the first time we booted it:

Windows XP Media Center 2005 SP2 setup

We installed on each system a clean version of Windows XP Media Center 2005 Service Pack 2 with updated drivers and Windows Updates and re-ran the tests. We went through the following process with each PC for installing Windows XP Media Center:

- 1. Install Windows XP Media Center 2005 with Service Pack 2.
 - a. Boot to a Windows XP Media Center 2005 with Service Pack 2 CD.
 - b. Press Enter at the Welcome to Setup screen.

- c. Press F8 at the EULA screen.
- d. Select the C: partition, and press Enter.
- e. Click C to continue setup on the C: partition.
- f. Select Format the partition using the NTFS file system (Quick), and press Enter.
- g. Press F to format the selected partition.
- h. Click Next at the Regional and Language Options screen.
- i. Enter a user name into the Name field, leave Organization blank, and click Next.
- j. Enter the Windows XP Media Center 2005 with Service Pack 2 product key, and click Next.
- k. Enter a Computer name, and click Next.
- I. Enter the correct date, time, and time zone area, and click Next.
- m. Select Typical settings, and click Next.
- n. Select Make this computer a member of the following workgroup, leave the default workgroup, and click Next.
- o. Click OK to have Windows automatically adjust the screen resolution.
- p. Click OK at the can you see this text at this resolution dialog box.
- q. Click Next at the Welcome to Microsoft Windows screen.
- r. Select Yes, this computer will connect through a local area network or home network, and click Next.
- s. Select Yes, I want to activate Windows over the Internet now, and click Next.
- t. Select No, not at this time to the registering with Microsoft question, and click Next.
- u. Enter User into the Your name field, and click Next.
- v. Click Finish at the Thank you screen.
- w. Select Not right now to Automatic Updates, and click Next.
- x. Select Change the way Security Center alerts me at the Windows Security Center screen.
- y. Uncheck the boxes beside Firewall, Automatic Updates, and Virus Protection Alert Settings, and click OK.
- 2. Download and install all Critical Windows Updates available as of June 16, 2006.
- 3. Set each system's resolution to 1280 x 1024 x 32-bit color at a refresh rate of 75 Hz.

We used Symantec's Ghost product to capture an exact image of the hard disk.

Each time we wanted to run a new set of tests on a machine, we used the Ghost image to return that machine to the above configuration. After re-imaging, we installed the software necessary to run the test.

Office productivity test (BAPCo SYSmark 2004 SE)

We performed the following steps to run this benchmark:

Installing SYSmark 2004 SE

- 1. Reset the system to the base test image.
- 2. Insert the SYSmark 2004 SE DVD, and install with the following default settings:
 - a. Click Next at the Welcome to the InstallShield Wizard for SYSmark 2004 SE screen.
 - b. At the License Agreement screen, select the I ACCEPT radio button.
 - c. Click Next.
 - d. Enter User Name, Company Name, and Serial Number at the Customer Information screen.
 - e. Click Next.
 - f. Click Next at the Destination Directory screen.
 - g. Click Next at the Select Program Folder screen.
 - h. Select Yes at the Do you want to move the programs to the alternate key screen.
 - i. A Setup Status screen will appear and run until the installation is complete.
 - j. Select the Yes, I want to restart my computer now radio button.
 - k. Remove the disk.
 - I. Click Finish.
- 3. The system will automatically reboot.
- 4. Unplug the network cable.

Running SYSmark 2004 SE

- 1. Launch SYSmark 2004 SE.
- 2. Click Run on the left-side menu.
- 3. Select Official Run.
- 4. Enter a name for the Project Name.
- 5. Select three iterations from the drop down menu.
- 6. Click OK.
- 7. When the benchmark completes, the main SYSmark 2004 SE menu will appear.
- 8. Select the Report button, then Official Report, which produces the SYSmark 2004 SE test scores.
- 9. At the top, click Disclosure.
- 10. Enter all the information the benchmark requires (which the benchmark designates with an asterisk).
- 11. Click OK.
- 12. When the report appears, click File→Export, and designate a location for the benchmark's Full Disclosure Report.

We report the Office Productivity score. Higher scores indicate faster performance and so are better.

Photo editing test (Adobe Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0)

PT created the 30 slide files and the background.mp3 file this test uses. The slide files have the following key characteristics:

- Resolution: 3008W x 2000H (180 dpi horizontal x 180 dpi vertical)
- Size: Range from 399KB (409,220 bytes) to 3,177KB (3,256,320 bytes)
- Bit depth: 24-bit color

The background.mp3 file has the following key characteristics:

- Length (hh:mm:ss): 00:05:10
- Size: 5.91 MB (6,202,980 bytes)
- Creation tool: AudioGrabber Freeware version 1.83 using LAME 3.96.
- Encoding rate: 160 Kbits/sec.

We performed the following steps to run this test:

Installing Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Premiere Elements 2.0

- 1. Reset the system to the base test image.
- 2. Insert the Adobe Photoshop Elements 4.0 DVD into the system, and choose the following options during installation:
 - a. Select Language.
 - b. Click OK.
 - c. Click Accept at the License Agreement screen.
 - d. Click Install Adobe Photoshop Elements.
 - e. Click Next at the Welcome screen.
 - f. Click Accept at the License Agreement screen.
 - g. Enter User Name, Organization, and Serial Number (which is on the DVD case).
 - h. Click Next.
 - i. Click Next at the Destination Folder screen.
 - j. At the file types you would like Photoshop Elements to open screen, accept all defaults.
 - k. Click Next.
 - I. Click Install at the Ready to Install the Program screen.
 - m. Click Finish.
 - n. Remove the disk from the system.

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- o. Click Yes to reboot the system.
- 3. Insert the Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0 DVD into the system, and choose the following options during installation:
 - a. Select Language.
 - b. Click OK.
 - c. Click Accept at the License Agreement screen.
 - d. Click Install Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0.
 - e. Select language.
 - f. Click OK.
 - g. Click Next at the Welcome screen.
 - h. Enter User Name, Organization, and Serial Number (which is on the DVD case).
 - i. Click Next.
 - j. Select NTSC TV Format.
 - k. Click Next.
 - I. Click Next at the Destination Folder screen.
 - m. Click Install at the Ready to Install the Program screen.
 - n. Click Finish.
- 4. Launch Photoshop Elements by double-clicking the desktop icon.
- 5. Select the Make Photo Creations icon.
- 6. Click Register Later at the registration screen.
- 7. Uncheck Automatically check for updates every month, and click Cancel.
- 8. Click No to the Photoshop Elements Organizer pop up.

Running the Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Premiere Elements 2.0 performance test

- 1. To run this test, you will need a stopwatch.
- 2. Copy the 30 slide files and the background.mp3 file into the My Documents directory.
- 3. Launch Photoshop Elements by double-clicking the desktop icon.
- 4. From the top menu click File->Get Photos->From Files and Folders.
- 5. Browse to the My Documents directory.
- 6. Select all Slides and uncheck the box next to Automatically Fix Red Eyes.
- 7. Click Get Photos.
- 8. Check Don't Show Again, and click OK at the Adobe pop up.
- 9. Select all photos shown by pressing Ctrl-A.
- 10. Click the Create button on the top menu.
- 11. Select Slide Show to create a slide show, and click OK.
- 12. Select 2 seconds for Static Duration and Transition Duration. Set Transition to Fade. Leave other options at their defaults, and click OK.
- 13. Click the Add Media button, and select the Audio from Folder option.
- 14. Browse to My Documents, and click Open on the background.mp3 file.
- 15. From the top menu, click File->Save Slide Show Project.
- 16. Name the file twofun, and click Save.
- 17. Click the Output icon.
- 18. Choose Burn to Disc, and select the DVD option. Click OK.
- 19. Click Save to create the twofun.wmv file while at the same time starting a stopwatch.
- 20. A progress bar will appear.
- 21. Stop the stopwatch when the progress bar disappears.
- 22. Record this time.
- 23. Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0 will automatically launch after Photoshop Elements finishes creating the twofun.wmv file.
- 24. Click Do Not Register.
- 25. Name the New Project PhotoDVD.
- 26. Browse to My Videos, and select that directory to define the Save In directory.
- 27. Click OK.

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- 28. Select the Adventure Template; its title is Adventure Main Menu and Adventure Scenes Menu. Premiere Elements will automatically select the radio button that says Apply a Template for a DVD with Menus.
- 29. Click OK.
- 30. Click No at the Missing DVD Markers message.
- 31. Click Burn DVD.
- 32. Select the Burn to option so it is Folder, and leave the remaining setting at their defaults.
- 33. Click Burn while at the same time starting a stopwatch.
- 34. A progress bar will appear.
- 35. When the progress bar says Export Completed, stop the stopwatch.
- 36. Record this time.
- 37. Click Close.
- 38. Close Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0, and select No to saving changes.
- 39. Close the Photoshop Elements Slide Show Editor window.
- 40. A pop up message will appear. Check Don't Show Again, and click OK at the slide show complete dialog.
- 41. Right-click the slideshow you just created (the upper left corner photo), and select Delete from Catalog.
- 42. Click OK.
- 43. Close the Adobe Photoshop 4.0 Organizer window.
- 44. Browse to My Documents, and delete the DVD folder you just created.
- 45. Click the My Videos folder.
- 46. Delete the following two files: output.wmv and PhotoDVD.prel.
- 47. Delete the following two folders: Encoded Files and Media Cache Files.
- 48. Empty the Recycle Bin.
- 49. To calculate the total time this test took, add the time you recorded from the Photoshop Elements portion of this test to the time you recorded for the Premiere Elements to complete its task.
- 50. Repeat these steps two more times, rebooting between each run.

We report the combined time, in seconds, that Photoshop Elements 4.0 took to convert the files to .wmv format with the time that Premiere Elements 2.0 took to burn the contents to a folder. Lower times indicate faster performance and so are better.

How we determined the virus scan workload

Many of our tests are multitasking scenarios that involve one of our tests as a foreground activity and virus scanning as a background. For these tests, we wanted to keep the systems under continuous multitasking workloads, so we wanted a virus-scan workload that ran approximately as long as the longest of the foreground tests. We also needed to ensure that each system did the same amount of virus-scan work on each test. To accomplish these goals, we created a directory that we scanned in each virus-scanning test. This directory has the following characteristics:

- Size: 2.91 GB
- Number of Files: 17,139
- Number of Folders: 393

We used this directory for every virus-scan test.

We did not choose to scan the entire hard disk of each system both to keep test time reasonable and to ensure that we scanned exactly the same amount of data each time. (Scanning the full hard disk would have yielded different workloads depending on which applications were present on the system.)

Running the Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Premiere Elements 2.0 performance test while scanning for viruses with Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006

After resetting the systems with the base test images, install the applications in the following order:

1. Photoshop Elements 4.0 with Premiere Elements 2.0. Follow the same set-up instructions as in the previous test.

2. Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006. Follow the set-up instructions below.

Installing Symantec Norton AntiVirus 2006

- 1. Insert Norton AntiVirus 2006 CD.
- 2. Click Install Norton AntiVirus.
- 3. Click Next > at Norton AntiVirus Setup dialog box.
- 4. Select I accept the License Agreement, and enter the product key at the License dialog box.
- 5. Click Next >.
- 6. Click Start Scan at the Active Applications Detected dialog box.
- 7. Click Next > at the Preinstall Checkup dialog box.
- 8. Click Next > at the Select the destination folder dialog box.
- 9. At the completion of Norton AntiVirus Setup, select the Restart Windows Now (recommended) radio button if Norton AntiVirus has not already selected it by default, and click the Finish button.
- 10. After the system reboots, click the Next button on the Norton AntiVirus splash screen.
- 11. Click Next at the Activation dialog box.
- 12. Click Next at the Security dialog box. Accept the default to allow Norton AntiVirus to turn off redundant Windows Security Center Alerts.
- 13. Click Finish to run LiveUpdate and perform a full system scan.
- 14. Click Next > at the LiveUpdate dialog box to run LiveUpdate.
- 15. Click Next > to install the updates LiveUpdate downloads.
- 16. Click Finish at the end of update installation.
- 17. If Norton AntiVirus suggests a reboot, reboot the system.
- 18. After the reboot, launch Norton AntiVirus by double-clicking the desktop icon.
- 19. Copy the Virus Workload directory to My Documents.
- 20. Choose Scans from the options on the left panel in Norton AntiVirus.
- 21. Choose Create custom scan.
- 22. Click Next >.
- 23. Click Add folders button.
- 24. Browse to the Virus Workload directory in My Documents.
- 25. Select the Virus Workload directory, and click the Add button.
- 26. Click Next >.
- 27. Enter the Scan name: Virus_workload.
- 28. Click Finish.

Running the test

- 1. Copy the 30 slides and the background.mp3 into the My Documents directory.
- 2. Launch Norton AntiVirus by double-clicking the desktop icon.
- 3. Choose Scans from the left panel in Norton AntiVirus.
- 4. Launch Photoshop Elements by double-clicking the desktop icon.
- 5. From the top menu click File->Get Photos->From Files and Folders.
- 6. Browse to the My Documents directory.
- 7. Select all Slides and uncheck the box next to Automatically Fix Red Eyes.
- 8. Click Get Photos.
- 9. Check Don't Show Again, and click OK at the Adobe pop up.
- 10. Select all photos shown by pressing Ctrl-A.
- 11. Click the Create button on the top menu.
- 12. Select Slide Show to create a slide show, and click OK.
- 13. Select 2 seconds for Static Duration and Transition Duration. Set Transition to Fade. Leave other options at their defaults, and click OK.
- 14. Click the Add Media button, and select the Audio from Folder option.
- 15. Browse to My Documents, and click Open on the background.mp3 file.
- 16. From the top menu, click File->Save Slide Show Project.
- 17. Name the file twofun, and click Save.
- 18. Click the Output icon.

- 19. Choose Burn to Disc, and select the DVD option. Click OK.
- 20. In Norton AntiVirus, click the Virus_workload custom scan to start the Norton AntiVirus scan.
- 21. In Photoshop Elements, click Save to create the twofun.wmv file while at the same time starting a stopwatch.
- 22. A progress bar will appear.
- 23. Stop the stopwatch when the progress bar disappears.
- 24. Record this time.
- 25. Adobe Premiere Elements 2.0 will automatically launch after Photoshop Elements finishes creating the twofun.wmv file.
- 26. Name the New Project PhotoDVD.
- 27. Browse to My Videos, and select that directory to define the Save In directory.
- 28. Click OK.
- 29. Select the Adventure Template; its title is Adventure Main Menu and Adventure Scenes Menu. Premiere Elements will automatically select the radio button that says Apply a Template for a DVD with Menus.
- 30. Click OK.
- 31. Click No at the Missing DVD Markers message.
